# WIEN RADIATION: A FAR OUT INTERVIEW WITH DEATH VALLEY GIRLS

KUCR: The Death Valley Girls, they just played live here at DasBACH,

in Vienna, Austria. and how'd that show go?

**DVG**: Super fun!

KUCR: So before we go any further, who do we have right here?

DVG: Bonnie:)

KUCR: Bonnie, the singer of the Death Valley Girls!

So, where does the name "Death valley Girls" come from?

DVG: Larry (Schemel, guitar):)

KUCR: Fun fact, my dad's name is Larry.

DVG: No way...

KUCR: You're all the way from Los Angeles, what's it like coming to Europe for a tour?

DVG: There's... so many words to describe it. There's so many words. Like, if you've never been to a different country, going to a different country every day, it's just unbelievable, it's too exciting. Like, it's almost like you have to shut off excitement in your body to just get through it. But like, we've been doing this thirty-five days in a row, we've only had two days off, and they were accidental days off, y'know what I mean? It's just like...you can't even imagine what it's like, to get to see these things you've heard about your whole life, like Austria, y'know? Like, 'Ahhh, Berlin! Everyone here is German! That's so cool! Paris, you're all French, like what is that?' We're not trying to find differences- we go around trying to find similarities, and you find so many more similarities than differences, and that's so cool. But it is still so exciting to be like, 'These people are the same as us- but they're speaking Czech!' Like, what happens in the Czech mind? Like, you don't know, and it's too cool.

**KUCR**: Do you remember where you were when you realized that you wanted to make rock music?

**DVG**: (laughs) Yeah. For sure. Well when I was five, I remember hearing that Billie Holliday was a Jazz singer, and that she was a drug addict. This is a bad story, though... I just always knew, like, somebody that lived and died for their music, seems so cool. And I just wanted to do that too! (laughs) And then I heard Black Sabbath for the first time when I was eleven, and I was like, 'Holy smokes...". Like, I never heard anything like that in my life, like, no Rock & Roll, and then all of a sudden you hear Black sabbath's first record, and you're just like, 'Whoa! This is also in this whole wide world that I don't know anything about 'cause I'm eleven, but there's this?' And I listened to that nonstop, and AC/DC, and the (Rolling) Stones, it was just like, 'I can't believe that (for) the rest of my life, I'm gonna have these records.' And I just wanna perpetuate like, this religion- Iggy(Pop)! It's like they are gods, like, I just want to have the same job as them. (laughs)

KUCR: Do you think there's a sort of immortality to Rock music? Like, the people you mentioned- Sabbath, The Stones- do you think we're gonna remember them a thousand years from now on?
DVG: Yes. Ot course. They're gods... Like, there is no difference between Jesus and Iggy... I don't think there should be any difference to anyone between what makes one person turned on don't think there should be any difference to anyone between what makes one person turned on and in love and excited and everything, but as far as immortality, I really don't think I can answer and in love and excited and everything, but as far as immortality, I really don't think I can answer that because I believe in ghosts and I believe in reincarnation and I believe that nothing matters. But everything is important, so I cannot answer that. I plead the Fifth! (Bursts out in laughter)





KUCR: So you said you believe in in ghosts?

**DVG**: You don't? Give me one reason why you don't believe in ghosts, and I'll give you one reason why you're not thinking fun enough.

KUCR: Do you believe that we have reptilian overlords?

DVG: I don't think it's so simple as that, like, I do believe in reptilians- what's so weird is they look like The Kid (Laura Kelsey, drums)- they're said to be blonde-haired, blue-eyed creatures that walk among the Earth and have, like, bizarre, beautiful faces, like our drummer (laughs). It's not that simple, like... (pauses to greet a fan, Bernhard Drexler of the Austrian indie rock outfit I'm A Sloth, and sign a vinyl-record.)

KUCR: So, you're from Los-Angeles, I'm from a small sleepy little village called Riverside-

DVG: (while signing another fan's vinyl record) Hold on, this isn't fair. Turns out I'm not an artist! I can't multitask! (Reminds Larry to sign a fan's record- 'You didn't sign that other dude's thing') Dude, Echo Park Rising is the coolest thing ever, and Echo park is the coolest, because it's like, Burger records, and The Echo, and a bunch of other things, The Smell, Pehrspace, Lollipop

(Records), like, all those things are home. Those are the things that when I moved to Los Angeles, I have no idea when, maybe it was five years, maybe it was three years, there was nothing going on, and like, Burger and Lollipop and all that shit, or stuff, sorry, made it all happen. Kids came out and played Punk and Rock music, even if it was just Rock and Roll. Even if that meant not punk at all, it's just a Punk situation, like, D.I.Y., but also like, not D.I.Y.!

(laughs) Burger is all there is, and Lollipop, of course, and Permanent(Record Store in Echo Park, formerly Origami Vinyl), and In The Red(Records), and Fat Possum(Records), and Third Man(Records), but these things.....none of that...that doesn't matter. So again, we are part of a university radio station, we got a lot of young kids, a lot of smart people listen to our shows, a lot of them got creative things going on their minds, in their real life, what advice do you have for all the creative young people and people of all ages to further their own artistic ambitions and endeavours, right back in their own little hearts and homes?

DVG: Iggy! Stones! Black Sabbath!

**KUCR**: Well, you heard it from the source! Death Valley Girls, here in Vienna, Austria, at the DasBACH bar and nightclub. Thank you so much!

DVG: Thank you, love you! I'm sorry I made bad words!

### I'LL HEAR YOU, BROTHER

The following is an excerpt from an interview with jazz legend Gary Saracho. In the 1970s, Saracho was part of Los Angeles' thriving jazz scene, and in 1973, released "En Medio", a largely overlooked masterpiece of psychedelic latin-tinged fusion jazz. Below, he recalls a surprise experience performing alongside rock icon Jimi Hendrix

"I'm living in Laurel Canyon, with my cousin. He's got a Mastiff, and I've got a Great Dane. We'd throw these parties. Laurel Canyon at that time, The Animals, The Doors, everybody was living in that area, and our particular place we lived was across this canyon, this big huge canyon, and we used to get together and have barbeques, and we'd have jam sessions and everything. So everything was going, everything was smooth, and there was this black guy that came with a big dashiki, and he was about 6'5" with a big natural. And he'd always walk in with a little lunch bag, and he'd walk in, and I look at this guy, and he goes, 'Hey man, want some lunch?' I said, 'Nah man, I got ribs over there, chicken, whatever you want, go get it.' He says, 'Yeah man, uh, thanks.' So I go up to my cousin, and I say, 'Hey, who is that guy?' He goes, 'I don't know'. 'What do mean, you don't know?' 'Well I thought you knew him!' So I said, 'I'm gonna go tell him', 'cause he just looked kinda funny, he's outta place, but he was there. I had a lot of black people and musicians playing, but he just looked funny. I didn't want no drug addicts.

So I turned to him, and I said 'Hey, man, I wanna let you know'- he goes, 'Hey, manlisten, man, I dig the way you play them vibes, man.' 'Oh, yeah?' He goes, 'Yeah man, why
don't you come down to this club on Sunset, across from Motown Records?' And I said, "Uhhalright. Is this...some kind of gag?' 'No. man! I'll see you later, man, I gotta get going!' So I go up
to my cousin and I say, 'Hey' 'What, he give you any shit?' I say, 'Wait a minute- he wants us to
come down and play at this gig down on Sunset.' 'Where?' 'Across from Motown.' 'Isn't that The
Souled Qut? That's that club, where everyone hangs out, all the rockers and shit.' So we gather
our stuff, he gets his congas and everything, I get my vibes, we get in the car, and he insists
upon having our children come- the Great Dane and the Mastif, so they were in the back of the
truck. We go down into Sunset Boulevard, man want."

We go down into Sunset Boulevard, man, we pull up and these babes are out there looking at us- 'WOAH, THOSE DOGS, MAN, THEY'RE BITCHIN', MAN!' And we get out and we go in the club and I say, 'Hold up, I'm gonna see what the hell's going on.' So I go in there, they're expecting me, so I wheel the stuff in, I put the vibes on the side of the stage. Nice-sized: stage, and the drumset in the middle was just really big, and it's covered, so I figured, 'Ehh, it's probably a double kick.'

So I go outside, I'm with these surfer guys, and we're talking about Huntington Beach, all the waves and shit, (we're) having a nice time. And all of a sudden, this cab pulls up, and out jumps John Paul Jones(Led Zeppelin), the famous rock bass player. And he walks in, and everybody's like, 'Heeey, maaan! It's bitchin', man! John Paul, man!' Another cab comes up, out jumps this brunette, with Jimi Hendrix, and this blonde chick. And they get out of the cab, they're

walking up, and this one surfer guy says, 'Hey Jimi, maaaan! "If 6 Was 9", bro! "Foxy Lady!" And he turns around with these two chicks on his arm, and he goes, 'Motherflower, I'm a million dollars in debt. You think I give a shit what you think of me?'

And he goes back into the club. And I'm standing here tripped out, and I'm saying 'Humunahumunahumuna'. I'm tripping out, I call my cousin, I say, 'Hey man, I can't go in there, man. What the hell? He's got his guitar!' What the shit's this? I thought it was "Candid Camera or something. I'm not gonna go in there, man, no one's gonna hear me! So finally, one of the guys behind the bar says, 'Hey, you guys are up.' So, I go up to the vibes, I'm walking up real stupid...Now, I don't know if you know what a vibraharp is, but it's got these aluminum things, and you them like bells, just a nice-sounding thing, but there's no amplification. So I'm there, man, and I'm getting it up and moving it out there and all of a sudden, I look and the cover's off the drumset.

"Buddy Miles". I said, 'What the fuck...?' I looked at my cousin, 'Hey man, we can't go up there! Look at who's the drummer!' 'Well, maybe someone else is using them, you don't know.' We go up there, we're like two bookends. Then here comes Jimi Hendrix up on the stage, here comes John Paul Jones, Buddy comes up, 'Hey, bro, how you doin'?' The guy with the bag, the one who I was gonna throw out of my party. He said, 'Hey man, let's do this!' So he gets up, and I'm tripping out, I'm kinda looking over, I look at my cousin, and he looks me. All of I sudden I hear Jimi-



'PAAAAAOOOOWW!'
'I'll hear you, brother!'

Just like that! And we played! I mean, they couldn't hear me, it was ridiculous, but you know what, that was a mind-blowing experience! When I tell that to people, they go, 'Whoa!'


